CABLE CROSSING IS USED AS WELL AS FERRY BOAT

Well they had a cable across and they bring this boat on that cable. Of course the man that—they just had one man, and he would steer it with what you call it, oar. He had a long pole that poled it that kept it straight. It would move but had to keep it straight. I have crossed it many times. I could show you places where to cross on horseback, swim, you know. They put buggy, wagon, and horses west on that ferry boat, and lots things on that ferry boat. And we used—they'd be the whole town, they'd cross it and every—thing. And we went across one time, I remember very well. We had
