BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Gazelle Lane was born in 1880 in the Coo-wee-scoo-wee District of the Cherokee Nation, which was north of the present town of Claremore, Oklahoma. Miss Lane attended the Cherokee Female Seminary in the late 1890's, then a girls school in Richmond, Virginia. The Pocohontas Club was organized in her home in 1899 and she is still a very active member and participates in all of it's activities. She was a neighbor and friend of the late Will Rogers. At the present time Miss Lane lives in Claremore where she has lived for a number of years.
