CHEROKEE SEMINARY BURNED APRIL 10, 1887

(Cherokee Female Seminary--first, when did the seminary burn, do you remember?)

Well, the old seminary burnt on the 10th of April, 1887. And my oldest sister, Ida Collins was there at school, at town of Tahlequah. And the Male Seminary, was there. Minister in town would go out from Tahlequah and preach there at these Seminary schools. Then at Easter, course all the ministers deliver the Easter services in the morning, and extra work--why then they went out to the seminary that afternoon. So, you know how they, every once in awhile, the preachers would come along and want to preach. So, this preacher came about noon. And was going to preach that afternoon. In the summer, they always have summer school. Different teachers would take their, their--
