Yeah, he was there...yeah, grandma was about eighteen months old at that time. That was way back in the earlier days. General Sibiston was in charge of that, at that time. They was trying to wipe the Indians out. Man, woman, kids, people runned and get away. There was four sisters, my grandmother and her sister, one of them put her on her back, that's how they escaped...how they escaped, I don't know. They managed to escape. They had to crawl into the brushes to get away...and the woman that was pregnant they'd cut 'em open to see if baby was alive. That's how dirty... That's one thing I don't want to talk about...

(I can understand why.)

That just burns me up...killing us left and right. That was the dirtiest deal that the Indian ever got, Sand Creek Massacre...

(When did that take place, around 1890?)

Way earlier than that. I wouldn't be what... I'm sure there's a history that'd tell you that. I never did ask my uncle when that was. I know he'd know. I wish he were still here, but he's gone now; he died in January. He knows more than I do. What I heard from Grandpa, that's about all I know. I know what's he's telling me is true.
