

They made a very attractive place out of it. Have you been out there to it? Several of those officers from Ft. Gibson, General Taylor and Robert E. Lee those men went to dances out there. Not only that, but they went to dances and parties at the Female Seminary. We don't have any record of it but I'm just as sure as I'm sitting here that those men attended those parties and receptions and dances. My father said "If you boys win that game"-- we were going to play Durant--said "If you win that game this afternoon," said "I'll let you go to St. Louis and let you see Jim Thorpe play." So we--that was 1904--no not 1908, 1909 I guess. Maybe '07, anyway, I got to go to St. Louis and see Jim Thorpe play, St. Louis University. Years later, I heard Will Rogers on the radio talking about that game. He and his wife, she--he'd gotten married-- Betty Rogers over here at Rogers, Arkansas, and they were on their honeymoon and they stopped over and he was at the game and was talking about it.
