We do custom sewing, research (word not clear) to the different dancing regalia of Indian tribes, predominantly the Osage tribe. Mrs. Toni and I both do ribbon work. We have been fortunately enough to be successful with this business. Last July, 1967, she and I were invited to participate in a full folk festival sponsored by the Smithsonian Institute, Washington D. C. We were on the fall there demonstrating our ribbon work. The ribbon work is not only typical of the Osage people, but many other tribes in Oklahoma, the Otoe and Winnebago, I mean Otoe and Ponca and Kaw in Oklahoma and then there are other tribes. Sac and Fox and Winnebago as well use ribbon work and each one is a little different technique. But among the Osages we have a very great demand for this type of work right now.
