Side B - Part I

(June 18, 1968. Today I'm visiting with Eugene Hummingbird a 70 year old full blood Cherokee of the Kenwood Indian Reservation in Delaware County, Oklahoma. This interview is to record the names of some of the older Indian doctors and the old Indian settlers of that community.)

Lived by Kenwood. (words not clear)--Ben. Ben, he's a witch doctor.

(Yeah.) (Laughter)

Rosie, Rosie, I see him in town once in a while.

(Yeah. Yeah, they're good Indian doctors.)

Yeah.

(And they call Little Saline--)

Yeah. And they's trying to boss us. And trying, you'd get the rent and everything like that. I got tired of it. (Interruption) (sentence not clear) used to. Only thing, Kenwood or Bad Hill (not clear)--

(Did they make good whiskey?)

Good whiskey! Yeah.

(Around Rose.)

Uh-hum. All died out up in here. Not what there was.

(Are there still many Indian doctors over there?)

Kenwood?

(Yeah.)

Yeah. I told you Ben.

(Ben, yeah I know him.)

And Arch Wolfe he's all died out.

(Yeah. That's Arch Wolfe. Uh-huh.)
