## BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Peter Hudson is a full blood Choctaw. He is 90 years of age and was born in 1877. He was born and raised near Eagletown, Indian Territory. In his later years he worked with the Indian Agency for 13 years. In the beginning of Statehood, he was elected United States Court Clerk and stayed there for 12 years. He is the nephew of the late Peter J. Hudson, an outstanding Choctaw, and who at one time was superintendent of Tuskahoma Female Academy. Mr. Hudson died in 1969 at his home in Antlers, Oklahoma where has had lived for over 60 years.
