GAMBLING IN EARLY DAYS

They don't know the value of it. The Army cavalry men taught the Indians how to gamble. And they played cards. They gamble. The soldiers win all our money and take it back with them. And the Indians gamble among themselves. I got some pictures of them gambling. They gamble in different spots. Just all over gambling. And when the soldiers, early traders, cattlemen, trade with the Indians, they'd sneak off and get all the Indians' money and the government found a law. NO more non-Indians gamble with the Indians. So they sent the United States Indian Police and the United States Marshals to see if the white man is gambling with the Indians and to arrest them. And the gambling went on as late as 1920. The gambling went on around the Agency and the river. After the towns opened, these townsmen skeak away to creeks and gamble with those Indians. And 1907, 08, 09, and 10 I was on the Indian Police. I arrested some of them.

(Oh, you did. That's going to be some more stories.)
