was two of them killed. They both—they buried both of them in the same grave

in the cemetery.

(Sentence not clear). Well, I really think one of them might been Sunday and one of them was a Ridge and the other one was Sunday. I guess probably not (not clear) I don't know for sure. And one of them was Ridge, I think.

(Well, justice and revenge was pretty quick in those days wasn't it?)

Yes sir! They believed in justice. They didn't fool around about it. (not clear) Oh, I know they get—those Indians get drunk and (not clear)
