(Recording made while touring grounds of the old Saline District Courthouse, the last such structure still remaining in the old Cherokee Mation.)

Strip payment made here for northern districts.

Courthouse ceased to function with advent of statehood.

A trading post was established neveralter statehood.

This was the second Saline District Courthouse and was built in 1870. The original Saline Courthouse was located about a mile west of present structure.

A cemetery exists on the courthouse grounds. Morse thieves and similar character were buried in unmarked graves in a separate cemetery about a half mile east of courthouse.

The Teenee Springs are Located nearby and are the headwaters of Little Spring Creek (formerly called Snake Creek).

A grist mill was in existance here prior to statehood.

A district jail was in maistance here, as were the

iving quarters of the District Sheriff.

A convicted Indian was executed here; he selected his best friend to do the shooting.

District maintained large stables at Courtaouse, and the roundations still remain.

Their womentelk would attend and would make salve of native herbs and animal fat to treat the wounds of the punished. A stone mortar and pedstel is preserved at the Courthouse such as was used during this period.

The Courthouse was scene of many shootings, and the issers were buried on the Courthouse grounds.

One of those killed one night was not attended to until next morning, but not before the nogs had ate part of him.

While the Courthouse was in existance before statehood there was a school for Indian children on the grounds.

Residents of this Delaware County area are hoping that the Cherokee Nation or the Oklahoma Historical Society will have ever this old Saline Court House and so preserve it for its historical value and interest.
