Yellowjacket. Then course her father, see, my father married, why his name was John Falleaf. And let's see, my grandmother, I don't know what her name was. Never did find out. She died before I was big enough to even realize it, I guess. I don't even remember my grandfather, But my grandmother, I remember her. Not my grandmother I knew on my father's side now. Her name was Falleaf. 'Course then she remarried again and she married a man by the name of Jackson. Colonel Jackson - and let's see -'course we lived over there on the river until I grew up, about - oh, I'd say maybe six years old. But then they didn't have any schools around there so we had to move somewhere where there was schools. So we moved up pretty close to where we live now. Only about pretty near a half mile north and about a half mile west from here. So we lived there then until my mother died there. And then my father, he remarried again and then we moved back across the river again, over on my father's place, he had a place over there. We lived there then. We stayed there until I come of age there and then I got married in 1925. Married my wife there and course then we build up here then, and our son, we got one son, he was born up here. And he's a deputy sheriff in Montgomery County, Kansas. He's at Coffeyville - he has an office over there at Coffeyville. Arid let's see, that's all the family we've got here. Wife and I and son is all, but we've got a granddaughter. Course my father and I, his grandmother, his mother, my grandmother, 'course we come up here and lived on her place, then I bought the place from her afterwards, and we built our home on it. Then, in 1947, we sold it and moved to Caney. I worked for Cities Service Gas Company a long time up there. And then we went from there into Texas and California and Arizona and around different places. Come back to Oklahoma again. We couldn't stay away from home, you know, we had to come back. So after we stayed in Oklahoma awhile I went to work for construction company then, building houses, carpenter work. Then we came, well after we came back then I went to Coffeyville. Went work over there at Continental Can Company, called can company, but it wasn't cans then it was aircraft. Contractors, see, then we built a complete plane to the part of it. And I worked over there in the carpenter shop about 10 years.

Carpenter at all time. They finally went out of, practically, out of business. They just cut their contracting. they couldn't get any. So they finally laid off pretty near everybody.

So we went back over to Coffeyville, I mean Caney, we was living over there. And I got a contract of mail messenger over there - Santa Fe, and that is the Post Office Department, office. On the Santa train to the post office. I worked at that, and we run a laundry. Fellow had his own laundry formed, and I worked on - it worked on their machines, you know, every time anything went wrong. So I worked there but I took the arthritis and that fixed me. I got where I couldn't do anything then. So I just had to
