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"natu tepo" means "medicine man"; "Medicine white man". But when you got power they call it "puhakatema". "He's got power".

(A lot of Indian people gave white men a name meaning hair on their face.

I was wondering--)

"motsokath" means "Hair on face; moustache; beard."

(When we were here the other day you gave me a word for a man--)

"mots<sup>o</sup> tepo" means moustache white man. Means he got moustache, white man.

It means they got hair all over their face.

(Doesn't "tepo" mean "white man" or is that the word you call white men?)

That's the word for white men.

(What's the word for Negroes?)

"t<sup>A</sup> tepo."

(What's the "t<sup>A</sup>" part?)

One's black and one's white.

(What about "Mexican"?)

"y<sup>A</sup> tepo".

j(What's the "y<sup>A</sup>" part mean?)

Just say they're Mexicans.

(How would you say the color white?)

"doso<sup>bi</sup>ta". If you say "this is white", i t<sup>es</sup> doso<sup>bi</sup>ta". Means "this one is white." "I t<sup>es</sup> s<sup>o</sup>."

(Does that "i t<sup>es</sup> s<sup>o</sup>" mean--)

"This one is--"

(Can you put anything after that?)

Yes, you just say anything about it.

(How would you say "blue"?)

"t<sup>ap</sup>da". That's blue.

(What about "green"?)

"bati widget<sup>e</sup>". It's like you know that moss in the water--it's green. It's named after that moss. It's means, "Its green."
