FATHER HAD 10,000 HEAD OF RAZORBACK HOGS AT ONE TIME

Yeah, one time he had about 10,000 head pigs all up and down the creek. They don't have no hog pens then. They had barb wire fence, about like that. Eight wires about that far apart, eight barb wires. He paid Mexican horses and ponies to get to put that hog fence in, about 80 acres up and down the creek. And them old razorbacks they call them, they climb trees. (laughter) Help themselves to nuts.

(Mrs. Curley: They eat pecans and walnuts, that's what they eat on.) They raise themselves and root up and get the acorn and pecans in fall of year. Every three months they have a litter of about 10 pigs and about 100 head of them give 10, 20 litters, you soon got a herd. You know you can't eat them fast enough. They grow too fast. At 6 months they great big hog. You don't have to feed them, they run in water. They just run up and down the creek. 'Course they raise corn and feed them corn, but they don't feed them all time. In the fall of the year you don't feed them nothing. Lot of acorns and pecans and walnuts and they just live on them. Get butter fat.
