(Sound familiar?)

I don't know.

(Mrs. Curley: That was Kickingbird's brother.) ...

(Name not clear).

(Mrs. Curlex: Name (not clear)?)

I was too little. All those old timers dead now. You don't know who to go to now to get any history. Aint's nobody left.

(Mrs. Curley: Is Bert Geikomah still living?)

Yeah, but he don't know. He can't remember.

(The original Kickingbird is supposed to have a daughter.) What's her name?)
Aut-mah. She was a princess sure enough. Real princess. She could have any-

thing in the world that she wanted. That like a millionaires daughter. Aut-

Mah. Today, people make fun of girl when they cry for something. "What's the matter, trying to be Aut-Mah?"

(Well, did you ever recall how many wives the original Kickingbird had?)

How many what?

(Mrs. Curley: How many wives did the original Kickingbird have?)

I don't know. Did you ever get that story of Mishkin Wes Labane or Jane

Richardson, or Rink & File of Kiowas? (Rank and Status among Plains Indians by Westly Labarre, an AES monograph)

(I've seen it before.)

They have a list of all the chiefs and how many wives they got. Find it in there.
