TIPIS: PREPARATION OF AND LIFE IN

(You said a while ago that you wanted to tell us some stories about the tipi.)

Tipi, yeah.

(Why don't you tell that.)

Well, did you want tell it in Apache or just tell it like I'm telling you. (Just tell it like you're telling it.) You know I got all those lined out too, like I'm telling, in Apache talk. (If you want to speak some Apache go ahead. I'd like to have part of it. But nobody's going to understand much of it!) I just got through talking Apache--I talk Apache to Rachel! (Her daughter)

Yeah, that tipi is what they call-- Tipi pole, they call it *sdd*. And that tipi, they call it *bègò.sbidéh*. That's what they call it. See they don't call it *gò.sbih* or nothing, it's just *bègòsbidéh*. And the other one is *sdd*. You got it down? Well, that's got two names, that *sdd*. *gèná.ʒá'è.h* -- this is main one-- *gèná.ʒá'è.h* --that's tipi pole. Yeah, but you got the other one down--it's all right. People had to go out and go in a canyon somewheres to get those tipi poles. You know that cedar. You know that tipi pole was made out of cedar. They go down in the canyon and chop. They get twenty-two, I think, poles they cut. And they fix it right there. Right in where they cut it. You know they have those--how you call those things?-- (Drawshaves?) Yeah. They cut the limbs off first. They just strip it off. They kinda make it even. Then they go ahead and fix it. Then afterwards they stand them up somewheres
