

And they don't give too much. I don't know how much they give but anyhow they buy them over there. And they began using tent.

(Did some of the Indians live in tents, instead of tipis?)

Yeah, they start using tents, then. Well, just here and there using tipi. Like us, we use tipi--me and my aunt. My folks they use tent. They have stoves in there, cook stove. See, the government issued cook stove and pretty near everybody's got cook stove.

(What kind of cook stoves were they?)

Well, it's cook stoves like-- It's just plain, flat like that there. Like this table--flat. Got rings on there. Four rings on there. And have damper on it.

(Use wood in there?)

Yeah, have two of them rings here and 'nother piece here and two here and 'nother piece there, and right there it has a fireplace right here. And there's a damper right there. You just turn it over and there's a fire burn. And if the stove get too hot you turn this over and it cools off.

(They use those inside the tipis?)

No--in the tents. Just in a tent. They got their own fire, a wood fire, in the tipi. In the tent they use stove.

(Didn't they used to make windbreaks sometimes?) Yes, they do. (Could you tell about that?)

Well, they got this--how would you call it? These weeds what makes your hand red-- I don't know how to call it-- (Bloodweeds? (Giant ragweed)) Yeah, bloodweeds.

They're tall ones. And some of 'em use willows. They put it 'round there to fix the windbreak. They fix it. That's how come there's lot of it. We used it 'round our tipi and my mother, they use it, too. They put it 'round. See, when it turn cold, the wind don't come in too much.

(Did your mother fix her own windbreak?)
