No, we live at the parsonage. They got a parsonage at Mulkehay Church.

Jenny: When we were sent to Cache-Creek, no parsonage so we stayed here and then it's closer. We went to church from here.

But at Mulkehay, they got a parsonage—at the Apache church and we just move from here and go over there and live in that parsonage.

(Well, now Mulkehay Church is an Apache church. Now how did you preach to them?)

I preach English. They all understand English and I don't understand Apache so I just--some of them understand Kiowa and then I just preach Kiowa and then English.

(Did you have an interpreter?)

No, no interpreter.

(How long ago was that when you were at Mulkehay?)

Oh, I'd say (unintelligible).

Jenny: About fifteen years or something like that.

The last time was -- the last time about fifteen years.

(Similar to the ones at Cache Creek?)

Same thing.

(Did you have all day preaching there?)

No. When I went there--because they got a new, we built another church over there, new church. Then when I went there for a while, maybe a year, we have all day service like old times. And then it went on and so it happened when the conference, the Board of Stewards of the Board of Trustees--when they met they just said, "Let's have a half a day service just like the rest of the church in the morning until 12 o'clock and then--and after that we will have a night service."
