Cecil: Well, all I know is just that he was a peyote chief, and he's a warrior and he's been on a warpath, that Old Man Asegonoh. He's Apache, that's Apache name.

(Did he have a wife here?)

Cecil: Not when I knowed him, he didn't have no wife. But he probably might have had a wife. Maybe she died, I don't know. Whether he has any family, I don't know.

(Who did he live with?)

Cecil: Well, he just live there as kind of a bachelor, the way I knew. He had a two-room government house and when his wife died, I guess he just lived there alone.

(Do you remember the names of any other Mescaleros that came here back in those days?)

Cecil: Well, I know lots of them, but they came with Geronimo or they was prisoners of war.

(Well, not the Geronimo...)

Cecil: Not them, but the other. That's about the only that I know of.

Jenny: There were some--I don't know--there was some. We call them Fort Sill Apache. And they didn't want to, after they turned
