North of Stillwell out there.

(Clu Five Killer. Well, there was a lot of people around Welling in the early days wasn't it?)

Oh Lord yes. Them Hodges brought ever thing in here (not clear).

They had a big store here. Three nice stores. One just right across before you get down from where the old depot there and then on out further there was jnother one. Everything's changed up now.

(Let's see. Your mother was half Cherokee wasn't she?)

Um-huh.

(Now what was her name before she--)

Mary Proctor.

(Mary Proctor. Well.)

(not clear) all over town?

(Yeow. There in Tahlequah.).

Well, and I'd been gettin' after 'em, been a holt of 'em three times to clean that out and all the paper and spit and ever thing on the sidewalk and tobacco cuds, bottles, cans, paper and ever thing. I said, do just what they done out here at Roswell, New Mexico--that's a big town. They said, "How did they do?" And I said, "You go on any of the highways out there and you see no bottles no cans, no papers, land--". And that night I went out there. They was gonna operate on my oldest daughter--she called me.

HOW EARLY DAY PEOPLE LIVED

(What did people do around here in early days to earn a living--around Welling here? Was there farming?)

They farmed and raised hogs, cattle, sheep, goats and the women'd raise gardens, chickens, turkeys, geese and ever thing. Dad-gum they don't do that. There ain't but one woman and one man around Welling here that I know now, that stayin' with the old time doins',
