My dad hauled the logs to the mill to build that Chapel, Mr. Franklin made a talk up there when, you see that Chapel was dedicated once to the Methodist. And they was gonna tear it down after the people had built it, they was gonna tear it down. And move it, they jest wasn't enough to furnish a preacher for it. They was jest gonna tear it down and get it outta there and and so we had to buy it back. I and rest of the fellows round here like me got out and you know it was hard to get a dime, I'm tellin you it jest was. And we saw'em and we could get it back for a hundred dollars, but a hundred dollars was a hundred dollars then and we jest had to go and go to get it then. Times was hard and people couldn't throw in much. And we got the money and paid'em back, with that --

Gibb: It was bought from the Methodist. And Wyatt Hunt, he quite a preacher
