She's a white lady that works in the Office. EMPLOYMENT OF INDIAN PERSONNEL AT ANADARKO AGENCY: (Don't they have a number of Indian people working in the office now?) They have Indian girls that are secretaries and all that. Lacer and Mr. Grisson--he's our superintendant -- everything has to go through them. (What about this Sid Carney? What is he?) Sid Carney? (Yes, Mr. Carney.) He's probably in there. I haven't done any contact with him. (I think he's the Area Director, but I guess.....) He probably is the Director but that's in the other office, I never have me

(He's Indian. I don't know what tribe....)

Look like to me--I noticed that--I think to me, that an Indian ought to help another Indian of their tribe to do better. But, to me, it seems like they don't do that. They don't stick up for one another. I don't see that. (Bonnie: Are the Indians that work for the B.I.A., are they outsiders or) (Are they from here? I think she means, are they Indians that grew up around here or are they Indians from other tribes that just happen to be assigned
