No. They don't cook in there. It's a big business--dancing outfit, you know. They ain't no cooking in there.

(Granddaughter: The women cook elsewhere, you see, and all the family that belonged to the Horse Tassels, they cooked separate. And then when the big day came, they bring all the food together. And in the meantime, the tipi was for their headquarters.)

(Well, I was just wondering if that tipi was always pitched, always set up in the camp, or if they just put it up when they were going to have a dance.)

(Granddaughter: Oh, yeah. When they're having this doings, that's when they put it up. And this Red Buffalo and White
