He'd holler and say, "Everybody that wants to smoke, come in the tipi." And they'd all go in the tipi and then they'd pass the peace pipe around and around and smoke. When they, when the pipe is empty of tobacco--no more tobacco, they take and they do this with a stick.

(Just ream it out?)

They spill it out. And, like that, blow it when they hold it still. They fill it up again and then they pass it around four or five times.

(Oh, yeah. When they have to fill it up, does just one man fill it?)

That man that owns it.

(I see.)

He's the one, that medicine man--he fills it up. Nobody else. He's the one that passes it around.

SMALLER PIPE CARRIED ON THE WARPAT

(Is there any special occasions when they would use this kind of pipe and not that other kind?)

They use this, well, both of them--they use this sometimes. They mostly take this kind on their warpath. It's much easier to handle. It's much easier to carry and they put it in the bag, you know. You ever saw any of those peace pipe bags?
