And whenever they found out that we were harmless, as usual, why they kinda dropped off and let us go. But I think that we do have a certain people in the area that are willing to work with us. But the majority of the work is going to have to be done by us. We are going to have to take on the various projects. One of the things that I hope we could do was to make contacts with the college students and if its necessary to make an agreement with the employer that we will come by and check on the employee ever so often and if he is having problems we will work with him, we'll counsel with him. Somebody is going to have to do this sometime. We are going to have to put our young people in employment to the extent that whenever they go and ask for a job, whether they are Indian or not, wouldn't make any difference. I know a lot of people are hiring negroes just because there's a lot of pressure on to hire them, but I don't particularly want us to get out in the street and march and burn flags or a draft card, because I don't think Indians believe in this. I think we are proud to be in this area and I think we can do just as much be letting people know that we want to do these things and are willing to work to get'em done. I think our politics in this area should be very active and we should be supporting persons that are willing to help the Indians and help to improve their conditions. Not only serve to satisfy the City of Lawton. And we should make our presence known and make it known in the areas that we live. We should make contacts and encourage people to do these things.
