

Mr. Timmons: Isn't she in college?

And these are the three examples of young people that should be in college and they should have all their expenses paid as far as scholarship--I mean to be going to school on a scholarship because there's no excuse for these kids not being in school. But there's no one to help'em and this is one of the areas that if this group gets organized we need to work on.

Mr. Timmons: That brings us a point that's been mentioned quite often here, that there's no follow-up on the first move on the part too often of an Indian. And this Dell Monnowesau, I heard sing at the Senior dinner at Carnegie, I believe it was.

Bud: You agree that she has a good voice?

Mr. Timmons: Beautiful voice. I told her that if she wanted to go to college, let me know if she needed any financial help. She thought she had scholarship at a church school. I wrote her after that and asked her to send me a tape recording which she said she would--to give to our music department for them to listen to, but I didn't hear anymore. I just assumed that she did get in college.
