

employed as co-ordinator of this program and Boyce, as consultant on a quarter time, but actually he put in full time on this job and full time on his job at the University. He was going day and night. And we went in to different areas and asked the people what they wanted, to identify concerns. Now something that hasn't been talked about here tonight and I think is of great concern to Indian people, is civil right, and law enforcement. This is an area that we need to help in. But, by and large, the program stems from problems-- local problems that Indian people are involved in, that they identify and that they are concerned with. Then we attempt to bring so-called experts in, to talk about these things. Now we have had as many as eighty or nintey different subjects that have been covered. And I think we need to go farther than this. I think this group is a nucleus of starting a program of action. Programs that we haven't had, in the other centers, in actually getting out in the field and helping people. Now we've done this to some degree in the other centers, but not to the extent that I think this group can do. This essentially is a program that is letting Indian people involve, identify problems, concerns and then working in these areas to help other Indian people. And it makes sense. To me its the logical approach because these problems now--we've always said that these problems aren't Indian problems. Actually they are community problems and they need to be solved at the community level, by Indian and white people working together, developing understanding, friendship and mutual respect and then working together to the benefit of the community.

Mr. Timmons: You will have to hurry, we are about to run out of tape.

Ace: One of the things that we can do, seems like if a group gets together and incorporates, seems like there are all kinds of projects that are available for Federal funds. Maybe we could come up with a basis of a certain amount of funds that might be matched with another--by the Federal Government.
