

And do this and we could set up maybe a filling station or something like this where by employing Indians and using the profits to put into educational funds to send someone to school and this type of thing. They might possible roll on and on. And they expand into all types of areas. One of the things that I hear all the time is, "Why don't some Indian start an Indian Pawn Shop." Because we've got people trying to sell--(laughter)--we've got people trying--our Indians going out to different people and selling all their Indian equipment, their stuff and they can't afford to buy it back. This is an area that maybe we could help get fair prices for and make it possible for them to get their material back and still make a little profit on. Of course it might be utilized in other ways.

Mr. Timmons: I wasn't laughing at your idea. We are trying to do that in one of the towns.

Ace: Oh you are.

Bob: I'll tell you another idea that we have had, right in line with that. Is to set up a community garage, where people can bring their cars in and maybe have a master mechanic there and then take youngsters and teach them mechanics, so that they can work on the family car and keep it in operation. This transportation is one of the biggest problems Indian people have.

Ace: They can't buy parts sometimes. Some --it might be possible to wholesale parts that they can come in there and fix their own car and--
