(Mmhmm.)

So the Christian Church is still down in the old location and First Southern

Baptists are here. And all their homes--I know every one of them that moved have

better homes than they had when they was down there.

(Mmhmm.)

Because they had to be fixed up to live in and they had to be put on a new foun-dation and every one of them were made modern where in old Alluwe they weren't.

(Yeah.)

But I have seen the time when there were as many as three, four doctors lived in Alluwe.

(Well, my goodness.)

You can't get a doctor here now.

(Hm)

And of course we never did have a hospital. But we had two doctors.
