(Cecil: speaks Kiowa)

NOTE: Cecil and Jenny are trying to say Elk Clan in Kiowa.

Jenny: Okó.gui, okó.gui. What does it mean? (speaks Kiowa)

Cecil: Elk lodge. They belong to the Elk Lodge, Okó.gui.

(What?)

Cecil: Okó.gui.

(Okó.gui)

Cecil: Okó.gui, that's the name of the lodge--Elk Lodge. It just like the white man. They had rules.
