that unless you come off through that river here. And they're back in there. That's where I pick up lot of them rock bowls. This lady here owns that land. She died now. She's got a lot of--she's got a big museum in that Blough--Blough (trying to say Blair)

Jenny: Blair, Blair.

Cecil: I went to that place and they plowed up in there. And they dig up lot of them old beads. Blue beads and long beads and short beads that's made out of turquoise, I guess: I don't know what kind, but I know that place.

Jenny: They find lot of skeletons. (speaks Kiowa)--skeletons. They dug up lots of skeletons.

Cecil: Yeah, in that place.

(That's that Wichita village?).

Jenny: Yeah.

Cecil: They don't publish that book no more.

(That's a good book, too.)

Jenny: It was owned by an old lady. White woman and she died. She's dead and gone. We used to visit her.

Cecil: I'd like to get me a new one like that. And then one of Martinez.

INDIAN NAMES OF THE VARIOUS KIOWA MEN'S SOCIETIES

(Okay, Blackfoot Clan--how do you say that in Kiowa?)

Jenny: To.kô.gw, to.kô.gw.

(To.ko.gw.)

Jenny: To.kô.gw. And then there's another clan they call ohomw, ohomw.

(Ohomw.).

Jenny: Yeah. And then ce. ta dw. That's another clan. Ce. ta dw.
