(Now do they, the Seneca's still have meetings houses, meeting places up in there?)

Oh, yeah. They have it--call it Bassett Springs.

(Bassett Springs.)

On Elk River.

(Uh-huh).

Then you turn on the pavement and go north about three or four miles--maybe little further. And they have signs that shows you. They got big place there. They got it all fenced off and have these pow wows, you know, these dances.

(Yeah)

I went over there once or twice. It was in the same place then about 1902, I believe.
