They have taken a lot of ideas from our meetings and it's turned out for them to work just as well among their tribes as well as ours. So, all these people did have a purpose in whatever they done, but they always had these entertainments to go along with it. 'Course that was their social life, I suppose you could call it. And that's how they would come to many decisions on different matters, always concerning the people, the tribe.
