(Did you ever plant wheat?)

No. I raised the same crops he did. I had a failure one year down there--cotton. We just got through chopping it and a big wind storm--dry spell come along and just left the stalks. Just like stems. We just got through chopping it--my wife and I and my niece--my oldest niece. And I had to plant it over and I didn't have no good luck with my second crop when I replant.

(When you all moved up the hill, were you married at that time?)

No. That's before I was married. No, I didn't get to get married till later in '20. We got married in 1920.

(Then did you continue living with your folks?)

Yeah. Yeah, we lived with them a long time.
