white people.

(Fred, have you ever heard of Indians leasing other Indians! [and?]
Not at that time.

(How about later?)

I don't know. I kinda did hear somebody said somebody got lease--probably

(I just wondered if you'd ever known an indian who wanted farm or raise cattle or something and lease some other indian's land so he'd have more land?)

No, I don't remember. In my days we never had so indian lease another Indian land.

(You know this bottom eighty on your dad's place--we were talking about this white man who had it leased for a while and then he moved--did he ever come back and lease that again?)

No. No, he bought him a place right east of Carnegle there.

(But later on, though you leased that bottom eighty to somebody else?)
Yeah.

(Did he have it leased for very long?)

Well; I don't know how long he leased it.

(I was just wondering if you would have the same lease man for years and years or if they change, maybe, every two years; five years or something like that. I've heard some people say they had the same person lease their land for maybe twenty years, and I was just wondering what kind of experience you all had.)

Yeah, there's some parties, they lease that. Just like the place down here I sold. That fellow down there, he had a lease for about twenty years.

I don't remember how long he had it. He told me he had it about twenty year.
