(Laughter) And, of course, we took some of our food down. My mother-in-law took some hominy and took some dried corn, such as different things that was easy to pack and carry. So, that's what she took down there. And I guess we--I imagine we stayed there couple weeks or more I don't remember just how long we did stay.

THE MORMONS WERE VERY GOOD TO THEM

(What--were you there--you there a few weeks--what sort of--they were Mormons, did they have a church there at that settlement?)

I guess they had church, but I never noticed it.

(You didn't see it?)

No.

(Seem like I seen a picture over at dad's down in Mexico, where they had looks like a kind of a--looked like a Mission of some sort.)

Well, I just don't remember the church.

(How did the Mormons--how did they live down there? Surely, they had--did they farm or how did they subsist and how did they--had to have flour--?) They must a had a farm of some kind, because, you know, like I said, they had a lot of beans and I don't know what else they raised, but I didn't see anything else.
