I see one of 'em's on a horse and they got flags. He's leading him to this home, but this picture barely shows it. It can't see--I can't say who's wedding that is.

(You can't distinguish anything about it?)

Huh-uh. No. And I have another picture here, I believe I might know this picture of Osage wedding taking place. They are ridin' in a little--little carriage with two horses pulling the lady--the bride is on there with her--I guess her attendants--bridesmaids. They both fully dressed in wedding clothes, with coats and hats. They got hats on with plumes and looks very good that you don't see nothing like that anymore. They are on their way going to the bridegroom's home. I think that was Jim's wedding--Jim Maker. (44).
