after she passed away, was placed in the Smithsonian Institute. And we. have travelled to Washington and we wanted to see this -- this Indian medicine bag which belonged to our great grandmother but we were unable to because I think it was put up on a display every so often. However, we are going to go see it whenever--next chance we get. But they--we were told--that's one of the things they tell us, that we are not suppose to be curious about these things. That they are usually buried with a person to whom it belongs. So we were a little undecided as to whether we really wanted to see it or not, but I would still kinda like to see it. And from that, my father, he didn; t practice any of this -- it was never handed down to him, even though I think he knew some things about it. But he laid all those Indian ways--like that down and he just--we just never did--or he just never practiced it. So, however, I became ill about 1958 or 59. I suddenly became ill with pain and fever in my stomach and, of course, I was rushed to the hospital. And they discovered that I had a gall-bladder infection and gall stones. And it was very painful. So my brothers and my family were concerned and they wanted to have a Peyote meeting for me to help . . me, and that was the only way that they knew how to help me. So we had this Peyote meeting and it was held in our living room, which was a large living room. And about 20 or 30 people came and stayed up all night with me. And I always knew that in my father's religious instruments that there was an eel skin, he always had in there. And I never did see him use it. But at this time when they held this meeting for me, they prayed for me and they gave me Peyote tea and I ate a green Peyote. All this was done during the night. And before midnight, they took the eel skin out and they placed it around my waist where I was in pain and prayed for me and gave me more tea and I became comfortable and, of course, I prayed myself, And I -- I would say I had this eel skin around my waist for about, oh,
