(Yeah.)

Feed 'em like feeding steers for market. Course he'd buy 'em for the army all the time sell 'em to them.

(Yes. Well, your father was quite a businessman then, wasn't he?)

Yeah. His time was...

(Yes sit. What was his first name?)

George.

(George)

He was a white man and my mother was an Osage. See I'm part Osage. He had a white man's ambition.

(Well.)

(Static on tape.)

Triangle building he had (words not clear.)

(Yeah.)
