BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Angie Barnes (Mrs. Jerome) was born in 1925, in Pawhuska, Oklahoma. She is a full blood Osage and now lives in Hominy, Oklahoma. Her early education was in Shidler, Oklahoma. She also attended school in Pawhuska, and then later a Catholic boarding school in Kansas from 4th through 12th grade.
