MEDICINE LODGE TREATY MADE IN 1867

(That's in 1867, a treaty with them Kiowas and Comanches and Kiowa-Apaches, and Cheyennes, Wichitas, and all those. They all came up there. When they come up there, Osages was there with U. W. Government. They just looking on see how they going to treat these other tribes. We already there when these other tribes come up there.)

Fred: Uh-huh.

(They wasn't very many of them and they set them over here and they just went over there, you know. But that medicine--what do you call it now? Medicine Lodge, I believe, isn't it?)

Fred: Medicine Lodge.

HERB MEDICINE

(Yeah, that's it, Medicine Lodge. They had that treaty, 1867. Just like, did you ever hear about the--these Indians that doctor themselves? It was before peyote. Did your people ever tell you anything about Indian doctoring?)

Yeah, they--you know, that Old Man Moses, you remember Old Man Moses?

(I don't think so.)

He used to be around here, you know. It was Joe Bird's uncle. You remember Joe Bird?

(Yeah.)

His father and Old Man Moses they were brother.

(Oh.)

And this old man, he had herb medicine, doctor with herbs. I remember that. He's not been gone too long, has he, Old Man Moses?
