BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Winnie Jones is 52 years old. She is one-fourth Creek Indian
and three-fourths Negro. She was born at Fort Gibson, Indian
territory and later moved with her family to her present home of
Tallahassee Community in Washner County, Oklahoma. She attended
Tallahassee Mission school until she was about fifteen years old,
and remained there employed as a school teacher until 1911, when the
school was closed.
