there. Fish, he lives at, everybody knows him by the name of Fish.

There at, well let's see, you know where Four Mide Corner is out by Dewey, north of Dewey? (Uh-huh.)

Well, let's see, go east two miles, well its, this road, its pretty near straight south here, south here. He lives there on his lot. He never did sell it. He's still got it, lives down there. Fish, everybody called him Fish. His name is Welsey, though. Nobody knows him by that name. Everybody always called him Fish. That boy has a orchrestra or something. They call him Bill Ketchum. (Sentence not clear.) -- two miles, I guess, toward Falleaf Cemetery.

CEMETERIES

'(Yeah.)

(Falleff cemetery, well. Is it on the highway?) What?

(On the highway?)

No, it's off the road, its pretty near straight north, about two miles north if you don't have to go around. Just straight north here. Falleaf cemetery. Another one of our cemeteries over where Young school was. .(Yes sir.)

One they call Linno cemetery.

(Well, Linno.)

It is on what we call the Belma place, I think (not clear) quite a few old places. But that one is called Linno.

(Linno.)

Another one down west of the Dewey cemetery. They call it post oak cemetery.
