Ned Downing was born in April 1887 at Peggs Prairie Indian Territory. He now lives on Rowe Prairie, Mayes County, Oklahoma on his original allotment. Mr. Downing is full blood Cherokee and learned to speak English while attending country schools in Iron Post, Liberty and Johnson Prairie. He has been a successful cattleman and farmer and still keeps a small herd of cattle on his 90 acres. He still lives in the home that he built himself, about 60 years ago.
