The Session was called to order in the Opera House, at 10 o'clock A. M. of the 23rd, by the president of I. T. Division, James W. Duncan.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Brannan.

The welcome address was delivered by Bro. Joe M. LaHay, of No. 248, Claremore, in the stead of the Honorable Mayor of Claremore, who could not be present at the opening ceremonies on account of sickness in his family (but was present and delivered us a good speech during the Convention.)

Bro. Campbell Russell, of No. 34, Warner, was selected to respond to Bro. LaHay in behalf of the Convention, which he did with credit to himself and to the Convention, after which President Duncan appointed a Credential Committee as follows: Bros. J. C. Johnson, of No. 49, Stilwell; A. Collins, of No. 293, Afton; and J. R. Frazier, of No. 139, Massey.

Recess was then announced awaiting report of the Credential Committee. The spare time was utilized by speech making by several of the Brothers until late in the afternoon. It was found that owing to the lateness of receiving reports and credential cards, (caused by secretaries of several subordinate orders not complying to instructions from our worthy secretary when he sent out blanks to each secretary for him to make said reports, etc.,) the Credential Committee could not report until next morning, and on motion and second Convention adjourned to meet at 8:30 Thursday, October 24th A.M.

October, 24th, 8:30 o'clock A.M.

Convention called to order.

Prayer was offered by Bro. Geo. Forest, of No. 35, Wauhilau, I. T.

President Duncan then appointed Bro. C. E. Minogh, of No. 35, Muskogee, as marshal, and instructed Bro. Minogh to select his assistants, which he did by selecting Bros. J. W. Freeman, No. 68, Bower; and J. C. Cox, of No. 274, Claremore, and as guards Bro. Brice and Bro. ———, of No. 274, Claremore.

The pass was ordered taken up by the marshal and his assistants, which was done and all declared entitled to remain.

President Duncan then appointed the following Committees to wit:

Special Kirkwood Conference Committee: Geo. Bengé, No. 336, Tahlequah; W. J. Smith, No. 30; Okmulgee; J. C. Leppe, No. 352, Oologah.

Also the Executive Committee was added to the above conference Committee.

Bro. N. W. Patton, President of the Loyal A. H. T. A. Division of Oklahoma, being present as a fraternal delegate, was called upon the stage and introduced to the Convention. He was greeted with cheers from the delegates, and a speech was called for, but as Bro. Patton had a severe cold he excused himself by thanking the Convention for courtesies shown him.

Bro. Patton's excuse was accepted and on motion and second Bro. Patton was seated as fraternal delegate to this Convention.

The Honorable Mayor of Claremore, Mr. Brown, asked to be admitted to the Hall and make a short welcome address in behalf of Claremore, as it was impossible for him to be present at the opening exercises.

He was admitted and gave us a hearty welcome, adding many good words of cheer and praise to our association.

President J. W. Duncan replied, thanking the mayor on behalf of the Convention, after which a convention resumed business.

President Duncan appointed Bro. C. G. Horn as Vice President pro tem.

On motion and second the Convention adjourned until 1:30 P. M. for parade.

1:30 P. M. The officers and delegates met at the Opera house and formed for parade by Bro. M. McDrummond, Secretary of No. 248, Claremore, Grand Marshal. 1st, the Claremore Band; 2nd, the city Mayor and Pres. Duncan in buggy; 3rd, other officials and Committees of the A. H. T. A. in carriages and buggies; 4th, the delegates on foot 4 abreast; 5th, the Claremore fire department; 6th, citizens of Claremore in carriages and surreys.

Parade formed at Frisco depot on west side of town, marched east through principal street to the school building in east part of town, thence back to the Opera house, disbanded and returned to hall.

President Duncan called Convention to order. The pass was taken up by the marshal and his assistants and all present declared entitled to seats. Pres. Duncan then submitted his annual report:

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

To the Officers and Delegates of the Grand Lodge of the Indian Territory Division of the Anti-Horse-Thief Association in annual convention assembled:

The All-wise Ruler of the Universe in His providence and goodness, has again permitted us to assemble in Annual convention for the purpose of enacting laws for the government and up-building of our splendid association and noble brotherhood. Since our last Annual convention He has seen fit in His providence and wisdom to call from our midst our honored and worthy State President, A. P. McKellop, who departed this life on February 1, last. We deeply mourn the loss of this beloved brother. His love and interest in this association was felt and known in every part of our Territory. We had learned to love him for his splendid ability, his noble purpose, his kindness and generosity, while in our finite vision it seems hard to have had him called from our midst. God in his infinitude and greatness, we have been taught, chasteneth whom he loveth, and we humbly bow in submission to His will and providence.

As Vice-President of the Indian Territory Division I felt that a grave responsibility had devolved upon me in assuming the office of president. Indeed it was a grave responsibility. The president of a division of this Association especially in a Territory where many new lodges are being or-

ganized, has many intricate questions to answer, and points on the law of the order to untangle and decide upon. Indeed he at times is compelled to make law in deciding upon questions which are propounded to him, upon which we have no written law.

If more members of the association would subscribe for and read our official paper the "Weekly News" they would learn many of the questions and points of law, which are ably discussed therein by the editor, the officers and correspondents, of the various divisions. I therefore earnestly request the delegates of this convention when you have returned to your respective sub-orders, that you urge upon the members thereof the necessity and wisdom of subscribing for and reading the Weekly News.

This is not the only reason that I make this request. Stolen and strayed property by the hundreds are advertised therein. We are often enabled to assist a Brother in recovering his stolen property. This is one of the prime objects of the Association. This was the object for which it was originally organized. This is a duty which we owe each other as Brothers in this Association. We have pledged each other this mutual assistance. Indeed we should feel called upon to congratulate ourselves upon having such a paper and so ably edited by our esteemed Bro. W. W. Graves.

Our association is one of the best secret organizations in the United States. I do not know of any other equal to it in the scope of its real usefulness. While we are strictly non-political and non-partisan we do not disclaim the moral influence that we have for good in the great coming new state.

While many of the best people have settled among us and more are coming, the up-to-date swindler and grafter is also here and more are coming and we must be on the move to meet the emergency.

Our division has maintained a steady growth and advancement during the year. About 72 new sub-orders have been organized. Our popularity is everywhere evident. People like the organization because of its cheapness. Our dues and expenses are so small that the poorest man financially may be a member if he has the honor and moral standing. I desire to impress upon your minds the fact that no dishonest man, swindler or slanderer should be allowed to wear the badge of this association.

In conclusion I wish to say that I have endeavored to serve you as president to the best of my ability. If I have erred it was not intentional. I have worked to steer the association clear of any of the political affiliations which have courted and solicited us during the heated campaign through which we have just past.

While the work which has devolved upon me has been quite volum-

inous and required considerable of my time it has been agreeable and pleasant.

In conclusion I wish to thank my fellow officers for the warm friendship which they have shown me, The most cordial relations have existed between us during the year. I wish also to thank you for the confidence and fidelity which you have shown me and for the many pleasant associations which we have had during the year.

SECRETARY'S ADDRESS.

CLAREMORE, I. T., OCTOBER 23, 1907.

To the Officers and Delegates in 5th Annual Convention assembled, of the I. T. Division of the A. H. T. A.:

Brothers:—This session of the Grand Lodge of our noble and grand order brings to a close my fifth term of the honorable position as secretary and treasurer of this grand division, which you have so generously as well as unanimously given to me for the fifth consecutive year without any opposition apparently whatever. Now brothers can you blame me if I feel a little proud and puffed up so to speak, over the fact that I have held your entire confidence and good will through these past five years of labor for the up-building of the I. T. Division? Yes and you may add nearly another year for you as temporary secretary in working up the I. T. Division.

The first nine months that I acted as temporary secretary I received no pay for my time or traveling expenses, or even pay for stationery or postage used by me in the work. The first year as secretary I received (\$150.00) one hundred and fifty dollars, the second and third year (\$200.00) two hundred dollars, and the last two years past I received (\$400.00) four hundred dollars per year and office expenses.

The first year of our organization I advanced the division (\$85 00) eighty-five dollars, enough to run on until we began to receive some returns from the various sources from which we get our funds.

Yes my brothers, just think that only five short years ago we had only 37 sub-orders out of a possible 80 lodges, not knowing whether the remainder of the 80 lodges would affiliate with us or not, but I am proud to say all except two did affiliate and those two went defunct.

We then had a membership of only about 600, but now we have some

350 lodges and a membership of some 12 or 15 thousand in round numbers.

We have issued Charters to 69 new lodges, two lodges reorganized and two recently from the Kirkwood lodges, making total this year 73 lodges. Doing pretty well when you come to think about it with all the uphill work we have had to do with in the past which a great number of you know, are conversant with and not necessary here to state.

I wish to say that peace and happiness prevails in our jurisdiction so far as I have heard with the bare exceptions of only two cases of dispute in two sub-orders, and that of a local matter only for which two appeals are taken up to this body for their ruling.

We have had only one cloud to darken our peace and tranquility during the past year, and that was caused by the death of our esteemed and much loved Brother A. P. McKellop, who was president at the time of his death. His absence is and will be felt in this division for some time to come, and his place hard to fill, but the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away. The will of the Lord be done, and we must acquiesce in the Lord's doing and undoing, regardless of our desires or wishes.

The membership is up and doing all they seemingly can to promote the interest of the order, and I hear nothing but words of praise and commendation from those outside of the order for the A.H.T.A. and the great work that the order is doing, and they are hastening to become members as fast as the opportunity offers.

And now Brothers as I have been pressed for time to make my report to you on account of some delays in receiving the reports and per capita tax of several of the orders and I could not close my books and balance my accounts as soon as I wish, and in fact they are only temporarily closed now. Then again I have not been able to work but I have stood to my post and tried to the best of my ability to have my reports ready, and you now have the results be they good or bad.

I want to thank one and all of the Brethren of the I. T. division for their patience and forbearance with me in the past, assuring them I have not left a stone unturned where I thought it was of interest and for the good of the A.H.T.A. And if I have seemed tardy or slow I wish to say that it was not because I did not try to do in my feeble manner what seemed right and my duty to do, and I am perfectly willing for you to be both judge and jury in the case.

I thank the State President, Bro. J. W. Duncan, and the executive committee for their kindness in the past year, and I wish to expressly thank Brother W. W. Graves for courtesies shown the I. T. Division, thru me that you know not of, and again I want to thank the national President, Brother John W. Wall, for his kindness to this division in the past. I for

one am in favor of throwing bouquets while the person is living and can appreciate the honor, and not wait till the cold earth covers this perishable body of clay.

So again thanking one and all I beg to remain as ever,

Corbin, a member of No. 403, find in our opinion that No. 403, of Wolf, I. T., knowingly violated the rules and laws governing the trial of a Brother, and that in so doing they have knowingly wronged our Brother C. C. Corbin, and we, as a committee, recommend the reinstatement of Bro. Corbin as a member at large by him paying to the state secretary of the I. T. division his per capita tax for the year 1907. We also recommend that the charter of No. 403 be revoked.

left as it was this past term, 10 cents, and on motion and second the recommendation was adopted, and ten cents on each member on the books of the various sub-orders in the Indian Territory division on Sept. 1, 1908.

Secretaries and presidents please read and note carefully the above.

It was moved that the secret work be with-held from No. 338 until Bro. Lon Lovelace had time to investigate and see if No. 338 was entitled to receive the same.

RESOLVED—That the A. H. T. A. of the Indian Territory mourns the loss of Brother McKellop at the hands of the "Grim Reaper, Death."

SALE OF INDIAN LANDS.

RESOLVED—By the Indian Territory Division of the Anti-Horse Thief Association in annual state convention assembled at Claremore, I. T., Oct. 23, 24, 1907, that we heartily endorse the enactment of a law at the coming session of the United States congress authorizing any adult Indian to sell his surplus land to an actual settler on time payments.

RESOLVED—Further, that we are unalterably opposed to the sale of Indian lands for the establishment of private game preserves in our territory, and we ask the congress of the United States to make such arrangements as will provide for the sale of all unallotted land in the Indian Territory (fit for agricultural purposes) to actual settlers on time payments, not to exceed 160 acres to any one man.

RESOLVED—That a copy of these resolutions be furnished each Senator and Congressman from Oklahoma, and that he be instructed to use all honorable means to secure the enactment of laws carrying out the spirit of the above resolutions; also that a copy be sent to the President of the United States and to each Senator and Congressman from other states, and that we earnestly request their assistance in securing legislation along the line above indicated.

BE IT RESOLVED—That the officers and members of the Indian Territory Division of the A. H. T. A. extend our most hearty thanks to and grateful appreciation of the hospitality and kindness of the citizens of the town of Claremore, and will ever be held by us a remembrance of one of the most enjoyable periods in the history of our order.

RESOLVED—That a copy of these resolutions be sent the family of Brother A. P. McKellop and a copy furnished the Weekly News, Claremore Progress and Claremore Messenger, and spread on the minutes of this meeting.

The special committee appointed to wait on the Kirkwood's Oklahoma Committee made the following report:

To the Officers and Delegates in convention assembled:

We, your Committee appointed to meet with a committee from the Kirkwood division so called A.H.T.A., beg leave to report as follows:

We find that it is out of the question to try even to unite with the Kirkwood division, from the very fact we would stultify our honor and break the laws and usages we are obligated to support, by accepting the the propositions submitted to us by the Kirkwood committee, which were as follows:

This Committee of the Oklahoma state lodge (incorporated) A.H.T.A., with plenary powers to amalgamate with the Indian Territory Division National A. H. T. A., offer as follows for the consolidation of the different parts of the A. H. T. A. in the State of Oklahoma:

1st. One grand division for the State of Oklahoma.

2nd. If agreeable to form one grand division, the Presidents of the Oklahoma State lodges and Indian Territory National organization shall issue a call for a joint convention of the organizations to convene at _____ on the third Wednesday in October 1908, at which time the President and Secretary of the Indian Territory organization act as officers of the convention until a temporary organization is perfected, at which time Oklahoma State Order shall surrender its charter and become a part of the National Division of the whole State of Oklahoma and charters shall be issued free of charge, the numbers revised, and such other steps taken as shall be necessary to perfect the organization.

3rd. The same basis of representation shall be agreed upon.

Our objections to their propositions are as follows:

1st, We could not recognize James Kirkwood as an Anti from the fact that he was expelled by the national body of the A.H.T.A. for disloyalty and disobeying, wilfully and knowingly, both state and national laws, and, hence, is not an Anti in good standing.

2nd, because we could not consolidate a live, working division, having paid all its per capita tax and assesments to the national order, with a disloyal division who are in arrears for per capita tax for the past three years, which the Kirkwood division is in the arrears to amount of over \$300, hence they are not in a condition to consolidate with.

If they wish to affiliate with the I. T. Division they would have to be reinstated into the national order by the national order making them pay up the back tax or remitting the same.

3rd, if we were to consolidate with the Kirkwood Division, the national order could and of rights ought to demand the charter of our Division for violating the national laws as well as our own state laws.

4th, and from the fact that the Kirkwood followers are in rebellion against the I.T. Division, the Oklahoma Division and the National Order, by following blindly the dictations of an expelled Anti who sets himself up as both national and state president, and they still persist in following after their boss, hence we could not agree to do likewise and we gave them the only feasible solution to the question of consolidation as follows:

1st, that they make application to the National body for reinstatement in the organization.

2nd, to surrender their books charters and seals to the secretary of the Division of the National Order of the A.H.T.A, in which each Kirkwood lodge is situated, and receive in return a charter seal and all necessary supplies as is furnished to new sub-orders upon organization, free of all cost, as many of the Kirkwood lodges had done, and are doing now.

These are the propositions presented to the Kirkwood Committee by us.

Now we respectfully submit these propositions to you for your careful consideration and action thereon.

The report of the National delegates was on motion received and adopted and a vote of thanks were given our National delegates, in recognition of their work.

Immediately after the National delegates reported it was moved and seconded that we donate \$50 to Bro. N.W. Patton's Division.

Motion amended by saying \$100.

Amendment accepted by original mover, question put by President Duncan and motion carried with a whoop.

Bro. Patton then stepped forward and thanked the Convention for their Liberal donation and promised to do all he could for the purpose it was donated for

He was applauded for his kindly manner and good words spoken.

On motion and second the place of holding next annual meeting was taken up, and the following named places nominated: Sulphur, Stigler and Muskogee. Muskogee received nearly the unanimous vote and was declared the place by President Duncan.

It was moved and seconded that the figures 18 in Article 5 Sec. 3 be stricken out and 21 be inserted to make said section conform with the national law bearing on said subject. Motion carried.
