My father, John Andrew, came from Ireland to the Indian Territory when he was about fifteen years old. He and the rest of his family traveled in a wagon; they came over the Santa Fe Texas trail until they came to old North Fork Town where they located and where there were only a few people at that time.

Mr. George W. Stidham / Mr. Charlie Smith, whose wife was a sister of Captain Wash Grayson, were there, besides a negro family there named Nero, who owned a store.

Judge G. W. Stidham and Charlie Smith owned a store or trading post there, too.

When my father returned home from the war he married Mrs. Dick Ross; they lived at North Fork town until I was about a year old and then my father took the K. and T. Railroad and built a house and moved to the place where Eufaula is now. My father and other ran a hotel on the east side of Eufaula; it was on the lot where Lee Stidham lives now. This hotel burned down. My father was a carpenter by trade and he did much of the building of the

homes and business houses of Eufaula. When my parents came to the Territory there were few conveniences of any kind and the country was rough and unsettled. Father followed the carpenter's trade as long as he was able to work and died only a few years ago.

My sister and I attended school at the Harrell Institute at Muskogee in 1890-91, then the Eufaula high school was built in 1892 and we came here to school.

When I was through school I was married to Mr. Owens, who had come up from Texas. He was a rock mason and built a number of buildings in Eufaula. He helped to build the cotton oil mill here. That was built about 1892 and he also erected the old Burdett building and the Tolley building, which were all built of native stone. The Burdett Building has burned three times but the lower part of it is still there and is being used for a business house.

The Territory was pretty rough when I was a child.
