Interview with Jake Lyons Capitol Hill Station, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Interviewer - Jimmie Birdwell Indian-Pioneer History, S-149 August 10,1937

Jake Lyons came out of Missouri in 1894 with a train of six wagons. They hit Oklahoma about the place of the present town of Picher and went a little to the east, following Grand River hunting a good fording place. Lyons believes that he crossed Grand River about where Grove is now and after crossing the river the party camped on the bank of Grand River for several days and they were at the foot of the north edge of the Spavinaw Hills which were alive with game and the party stocked up with enough wild, meat to last them the rest of They made a wide circle west around the hills the trip. on a line about evem with the town of Big Cabin and then back east to a place close to Salina. They were not in a big hurry as they were hunting a good location for farming with plenty of water and timber for their houses. Lyons said the country was so pretty and so well stocked with game that he just kept going on hunting something better. The train kept wondering around until they had

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to throw away a half wagon load of meat that had spoiled.

They had killed the wild game around Grove, and they

finally ended up in the Seminole Nation but they did not

like this country and Lyons came to Oklahoma City with

the others/going on to Texas. Lyons built a shack across
the river from Oklahoma City on what was later Capitol

Hill, which was one of three houses on Capitol Hill. There

was no way of crossing the river except by fording it and
this was sometimes hard to do.
