Son of Joshua Kilpatrick and wife Eliza.

was born in Indian Territory in 1842, four years after the parents maigrated west to the Indian Territory. Later he dropped the first art of his name and was afterward known as John Patrick. He said hat the original name was much too long for common use.

He was married to Miss Minerva Lillard. They located in Illinois istrict. After her death he was married to liss Limina Fields. They eared a large family.

He built and operated a general merchandise store on the Arkansas iver, twelve miles last of Mushogee for a number of years; in connection ith his other business he operated a ferry across the Arlansas that ater became known as the Amith Perry. A costoffice was established a week, here, known as Patrick where the mail was received three times brought y a man on horseback from Mushogee. With the coming of the Iron cuntain Railroad through Braggs he moved his store to Braggs where he ontinued in business until shortly before his death in 1927.

In connection with other things he caned the first cotton gin in that section of the country. Being successful in all business interprises he was able to render to veluable assistance to those less fortunate. His heart and hand was always open to calls from he needy.

At his death, the entire community grieved for a true friend.
