Interview: Thomas Olin thanks

Thomas Clin Shanks, son of Rev. Ceorge Shanks and Pary Ann Shanks, was rn in Clark County, Mississippi, seven miles east of Shubuta, on November . 1867. He comes of a long line of preachers. His father was a local "ethist preacher. His paternal grandfather, James Shanks, was a traveling preach in the Alabama Conference for many years. Rev. James Shanks' fether was Methodist preacher as was his father, who was converted under the ministry John esley or his workers in Ireland, having been born in Dublin. The bject of this sketch was converted at the age of nine. He mived with his rents to Dixie, four miles north of whitesboro, Texas and lived in that mmunity for two years. Then his family moved to Cooke county, thirteen les southeast of Gainesville and four miles west of Collinsville where iomas clin lived for about ten years. Thile in Mississippi, he had no edutional advantages, except in his home, as there were no public schools in s community at Dixie in Texas. He attended the schools in his community tooke county-for several years. Early in life he felt the call to service the church and under the preaching of Rev. J. . Chanks, his brother, he mmitted himself to God for the work of the ministry. Ge secured further ucation at Collinsville academy, Thitesboro Normal School and later at puthweatern University at Georgetown. Texas

ne was pastor when twenty-one years of age, 1889-89, on Tahlequah cruit serving blue Springs, Bald Hill, Crittenden, Eureka and Grand River mrches.

In 1890 at the conference at Makogee, he was ordained Deacon by shop sugene R. Hendrix and admitted on trial in the Indian Mission Conference of the Lathodist Apiscopal Church, South. He served two years on the

ingtown Circuit. Then he was sent to the Cameron charge. Just after rewing this appointment, he was happily married to Miss Alice L. Mightower
Tehlequah, the date being Movember 24, 1802. The marriage was solemnized
the then new brick Methodist Church by Rev. J. J. Lovett, the Paster, who
the step-father of the bride.

At tameron a parsonage was secured, a church built, and a revival was d resulting in conversions in each of the five appointments. The next conence being held, Thomas Clin was sent to Mebber's Falls Station. Here he charge of a church school, ebber's Falls Academy. His work was very hard successful here. Then to Duncan where he built a parsonage and a church received ninety-two members. Next to Checotah where he said a church t, then the church was blown down and it was re-built. Then to "criette re he finished a church building; then to S awnee where he improved a sonage and secured lots on which the magnificent church now stands. Then Holdenville where he paid a church debt and erected a fine five-roomed sarage. Then to spire where he was the instrument in saving souls. The next r he was in Tishomingo where he repaired a parsonage and assisted in a real. The next charge was Lexington, Cklahoma where a fine revival was held which three homan Catholics were converted and joined the ethodist of rech.

the close of the second year, T. C. transferred to the .t. Louis

Corence and spent two successful years in Malden Station where he overhauled

parsonage and had a revival; at the end of the year he transferred to his

conference and was stationed at .Iton. Thence he went to Mill Creek, Stone
1, estville, neota, Boynton, Vian (3 years), Kiowa (3 years), Allen (2 yrs.)

Lawson bennington, from whence he moved in 1923 to Tahle wah and has lived

s since, except two years at Braggs.

Rev. and Mrs. T. C. Shanks have five sons, all of whom have secured rt of their education at Tahlequah. L. E. took the course at the Normal, ., Jr. attended, James L., William and John C. took their h. B. here. r James and William took their Master degree at Teabody and John his at lwater, Ckla., each has work on his Doctor's degree. James and John at mbia, New York, and William at Peabody.
