## Interview with Gus Smith, Ringfisher, Oklehoma

I was born in New Madrick, Missouri and came to Oklahome after the Openine in 1889, locating at Mingrisher and intending to stake some of the land that had not been filed on at that time.

when I came to this country there was still quite a bit of land that had not been filed upon and I thought I would try to secure one of these eighty acres, but it was not easy to do this because so much of the land was sruggled; by that I mean maybe one person would stake on a place and his brother would stake on another, leaving one place in between, which would be held until a relative would come and file a claim on that section. It could plainly be seen that Oklahoma was no

place for a poor man to secure land after the opening because you just had to have some cash to buy off either the one joining the land or employees at the land office. This was very hard on a who had come here to make my hose, because I had sold everything before I left my native state and I had nothing to return to, so I stayed and made the best of every-
